What changed?

- Las Vegas vs. Los Angeles, but actually...
- Phoenix tryout, January of 2017
 - Another teammate of mine had his tryout on the same day, made the show in summer 2017
- Planning on taking online test, late March 2019
- Until...



- This was Wednesday, March 13th, 2019
- I was to fly to LA on 3/29 for a game on 3/30
 - Unusual that this was a Saturday
 - Accelerated taping schedule to accommodate medical treatment
- Time for me to binge-watch shows on DVR and study the Jeopardy! Archive

History of Jeopardy! Television Program

- Created by Merv Griffin
 - Originally on air from 1964-1975
 - Did you know: When Jeopardy! was canceled, Wheel of Fortune replaced it the following week!
- Rebooted in 1984 with legendary host Alex Trebek and announcer Johnny Gilbert
- Over 8000 episodes, tons of awards, etc.

Rules of Jeopardy! gameplay

- Three contestants choose from six categories of five questions
 - First round: \$200-\$1000
 - Second round: \$400-\$2000
- If contestant selects a Daily Double (placed randomly on board) they can make a wager of their choosing
 - 1 DD in first round, 2 DD's in second
- Final Jeopardy! is one clue from announced category and players can secretly wager any amount from their total. The winner has most money after FJ. In case of a tie, a single (?) tiebreaker clue is presented.
- Famously, players must phrase their responses in the form of a question.

Behind the Scenes Stuff (2019 version)

- Five shows are usually taped each day, with the survivor of the final show brought back for the next taping day.
- Contestants are expected to bring four or more different outfits in case they win.
- Challengers for each match are only announced minutes before show begins taping.
- Friends are in audience and cannot interact with any contestant until they lose.
- Interview topics are submitted by players and chosen for each day after consultation with production staff.
- Shows are taped up to 4 months ahead of airdate.
- Buzzers are a lot more complicated than you might think!

It's Showtime!

- Returning champion was Sam Kavanaugh
 - Went on to win \$156K over five games
 - Quite intimidating
 - Fellow teacher
- 3rd show of day – Sam lost handily to Roey
- 4th show of day – Roey lost an **incredible** match to Nathan, another teacher
 - Miracle scores after final question of regulation
 - TWO tiebreakers needed to settle match
- By not being called for 4th show, I could relax for 30min before my game.

Show #1 - Pregame Evaluation

- First time meeting Mr. Trebek
- First correct answer: “What is quarantine?”
- Correctly got Saturn V missile right
- Told story about winning by striking out
- 2/2 on DD’s on Cryptocurrency and The Mikado
- FJ: “It's the only state to have had 4 female governors, 3 of whom served consecutively between 1997 & 2015”
- Winnings: \$26,600
- Return to ABQ and prepare for a different (??) game show

Shows #2-6 - Pregame Evaluation

- Survived precarious situations in **FOUR** consecutive games
 - Very fortunate how the final clue went in game 2
 - Different wager on DD changes outcome in game 3
 - Needed to get FJ right to secure victory in games 3&4
 - Precise scores before FJ in game 5 lead to WILD finish
 - 1970 Album Reviews: “Rolling Stone said this 1976 album had "the best & worst tendencies of L.A.-situated rock" & was an "unflattering portrait of the milieu””
- Winning the last game of the day meant I would lead off the next season as champion

Plus/Delta from games 1-6

- (+) Able to luck into Maurice Sendak from “1964” and “Picasso of children's books”.
- (+) Able to sniff out Scrabble from game originally called “Lexico”.
- (+) Able to rally from throwing away all my money on a DD in the category “Seas”.
- (Δ) Missing that DD in the first place
- (Δ) Not seeking out DD’s well enough
- (Δ) Misreading FJ that could have ended everything
- (Δ) 3/6 on FJ is quite pedestrian
- (Δ) Missing \$1000 clue on “Quail”, huh.

Time to get **VERY** serious

- 3.5-month break between April 6 and July 22 taping dates
- Worked with old friend and record holder Roger Craig
 - Question database, strategy help, good vibes
- Several hours a day devoted to studying
 - Lots and lots of Sporcle quizzes on weak topics
 - Mix in sudoku, crosswords, Anki, working out to keep sharp
- Run through backlog of new episodes on DVR
 - Take what I can from James Holzhauer's phenomenal run
- Buzzer App practice
- Try my very best to keep a secret

Shows #7-11 - Pregame Evaluation

- Funny moment in hotel lobby on way to taping
- Wore tie from high school and told story about my father
- Plenty of +, very little Δ
 - 4/5 on FJ – only one I missed was ludicrous
 - After settling in, all games were decided before FJ
 - Best show (\$58400) could maybe have been even better?
 - Performed tribute to my mother via one FJ result
 - Got a rise out of Mr. Trebek on “minuet” DD
 - In retrospect, celebrated a little too hard that night...

Shows #12-16 - Pregame Evaluation

- Problematic warnings from the very first game
 - \$20K swing on very gettable FJ on European Authors
 - Calamitous 2nd game – anyone can win!
 - In the negative for awhile on 3rd game
 - Thank goodness for Twisted Sister
 - Outbuzzed consistently on 4th game, no DD's
 - Had lock in 5th game by slimmest of margins
 - Made it rain \$5 bill(s)
- 5 more wins, at about half the yield of previous week
- Running out of energy – and stories

Shows #17-20 - Pregame Evaluation

Knowledge: 8.5/10

Speed: 9.5/10

Nerves: 10/10

Strategy: 9/10

Wagering: 8.5/10

Timing: 6/10

- Back fresh after a two week break
- Strong start, three good wins – very competitive 3rd game
- Game #20 – luck finally evened out
 - Knew all three DD's, didn't get any
 - Flip any single question to me for probable lock
 - Whiffed on very gettable FJ, lost to good player
 - “The Eighth Wonder”, by composer Alan John & librettist Dennis Watkins, is about this building that opened in 1973”
 - Haven't missed a question about this one since!!!

Plus/Delta from games 7-20

- (+) Lots of quickness, ability to compete on most clues
- (+) Significant increase – \$22.9K to \$30.4K per game
- (+) Very rarely felt pressure
- (△) Buzzer timing degraded across the games
- (△) Missed some key clues on key questions
 - Anthem “(w)ith lyrics by Sir Adolphe-Basile Routhier...”
- (△) 11/20 on FJ – stark difference from rest of performance
 - (!) Need to reorganize solving/calculating process

Time to get **VERY VERY** serious

- Tournament of Champions awaits...someday
 - Ended up a full 20 months after previous trip to Culver City
 - Date was moved several times for sad reasons
- Relied upon same resources as before (Roger, J-Archive, Sporcle)
- Prioritized knowledge based on expected likelihood of appearance
 - Exposure and vague familiarity with nearly everything
 - Lots of views/angles of common topics
 - States, Countries, Authors, Geographical Features, Chemical Elements, Composers, Artists, Top Films/Plays/Musicals, Wars, Monarchs, Capitals, Currencies, Flags, Acronyms, State Quarters, National Parks, Olympics, Empires, Animals, Operas, Paintings, Stock Symbols, Election Losers, Vice Presidents, Amendments, Foreign Words and Phrases, and **many** more

Time to get **VERY VERY** serious (cont.)

- New sources of information
 - Quiz Nations international online team game; BP Trivia
 - Mental Floss quiz book; Ladies' Room Reader Quiz Book
 - Brainiac and Maphead, both by Ken Jennings
 - Every clue from last 15 TOC's
 - Researched/summarized unfamiliar answers
 - 73 pages of "Pavlov Revisited" from online Jeopardy! group
 - Recent Oscars, very recent books, cultural topics
 - 2020 Zoom Jeopardy! TOC Champion!
- How to attack wordplay categories?
 - Studied Greek/Latin roots (relentlessly)
 - Quizzed on loanwords from foreign languages
 - Crosswords/Cryptics, Words With Friends, Lightning Round

Behind the Scenes Stuff (2021 version)

- COVID compliance is paramount!
 - PCR test, N95 masks provided
- No audience
- To keep distance, we were in WOF studio
- TOC host was possibly a secret, but once word got out we were asked to publicize it ourselves
 - Buzzy Cohen – superchamp, 2017 TOC champ
- Buzzer practice minimal
- Show put us up in otherwise closed hotel
- 15 contestants – 2 tourney champs, 13 3+ game winners
 - 2 alternates in case of COVID positive case

Plus/Delta from TOC

- (+) Got every FJ I attempted (and most I didn't)
- (+) Direct help on certain answers from studying
 - “Love, Valour, ?????”, “Stock symbol X”
- (+) Still solid at pop culture categories – movies, sports
- (Δ) Timing was erratic, preparation was limited
 - Felt like a rookie at times
- (Δ) Nerves kicked in as answers didn't
- (Δ) Flattened in 1st game
- (Δ) Massive blunder in 2nd game

Final Thoughts

- Slim margins → large variance
- Reliving summer of 2019 in spring of 2021 was unlikely
 - Same hotel, different everything else
 - At a very different place in life
- No shame in how TOC turned out
 - Jennifer, Sam both all-timers
 - Anybody there could've won
 - Greatest story (n)ever told
- Not likely to forgive myself for wager
 - That's life
- **Random playlist said it best**
